#### 10. General business

10.1 Michael Fish and Tanya Barmby from BMD spoke to the CEC about the company and their approach to wind farm construction. BMD was involved in the recent construction of the Hawkesdale Wind Farm.

BMD is aware of the requirements of the endorsed Traffic Management Plan which relates specifically to construction-related traffic.

The TMP includes requirements for:

- Heavy construction vehicles to avoid interaction with school buses.
- Signage to be erected prior to construction at roads that are not approved for use by construction vehicles, such as Wickhams and Slatterys Roads.
- A clear process for inspection and repair of roads approved for use by construction traffic.

#### 1 UPDATE FROM THE PROJECT TEAM

Much great work has been done over the past few months, and the Project is now very close to being able to start construction. However, it remains subject to financing before it can proceed.

Significant time and effort has been spent in discharging the various planning permit conditions which are required to be met prior to the commencement of works on the site. This has included discussions with authorities, as well as specialist consultants to ensure the documents and plans prepared are robust. The team is pleased to share that these are now complete, and that a summary of the endorsed plans and documents can be found in the next section and copies are available on our website.

Whilst the Project is now considered 'ready-to-build' (meaning contracts are materially agreed), before contracts can be entered into and construction started, successful completion of the financing process is required. The recent volatile global and local economic conditions has added some complexity to this workstream but the team is continuing to take the Project forward. The team would like to acknowledge the delays to our previously communicated anticipated time for the Project starting construction and thank the community for its patience.

As was shared with community representatives during the April Community Engagement Committee meeting, the Project is pleased to have selected BMD Constructions to undertake the Balance of Plant construction works; that is, the contractor who will be responsible for delivering the civil and electrical preparatory site works prior to the turbines being delivered and installed. The team acknowledges that this is a change from the original contractor appointment, however, given that BMD has successfully delivered the nearby Hawkesdale Wind Farm, through which it has become familiar with the local area, the decision to select BMD is considered both a best-for-project and community outcome.

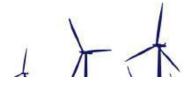
By way of other updates, a request was made (on behalf of the community) that the Project consider increasing the value of the community benefit fund. The Project has given consideration to this and agrees that it is fair and reasonable in light of the high levels of inflation and escalated cost-of-goods in recent years. The Project team is therefore pleased to announce that the starting value of the annual fund supporting community led initiatives will now be \$72,000. Further details about this increase and the fund are provided in the next sections, along with activities that will be undertaken following start of construction.

#### Procurement for construction

#### Balance of Plant

The Project has selected BMD as head contractor. BMD is Australia's leading integrated engineering, construction and urban development business, with foundations built on family values that underpin their unique collaborative approach. Notably, BMD has successfully delivered recent projects in the region, such as the nearby Hawkesdale Wind Farm. The Project team is very pleased to welcome a company of BMD's reputation on board. BMD will be partnering with RJE as their subcontractor for delivering the onsite electrical works.

#### Turbine supply

The Project has worked with GE for the last few years now and the team is pleased to have their support. GE has assisted the Project in gaining approval from the electricity network operators for the wind farm to connect to the grid. GE will supply, install and commission the turbines for the Project, such that the power they produce can be exported into the grid.

#### Electricity Network

Powercor is responsible for the connection and distribution line works (as described in the overview flyer linked here on the website).





#### 2 WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING?

Evolution of the project and on-going workstreams

#### Community

#### Community Benefit Fund

The Project has approved increasing the community benefit fund amount. The fund will now provide up to \$72,000 each year (increasing annually with inflation). This represents a 20% increase from the previous value (of \$60,000 p.a.) and aligns with funding to the amount of \$1000 per MW of generation capacity proposed to be installed on the site. The intent of the fund remains unchanged - to generate positive action and investment into the local community. A fund committee will be established which includes two local residents and two proponent representatives to assess grant applications against the eligibility criteria. Given the imminent nature of Financial Close, the Project will be calling on local residents to self-nominate to be part of this committee soon.

#### Local business engagement session with the Contractor

The Project has raised with BMD holding a business engagement session where locals can come and meet the contractor to express their interest in employment (for roles on site during construction) and to discuss what opportunities there might be for local businesses. The timing for this session will be confirmed in due course, but as was discussed with the community representatives, ideal timing is considered to be soon after NTP is given but prior to their mobilisation for start of construction works.

#### 3 WHAT HAPPENS AFTER FINANCIAL CLOSE?

#### Next steps

Once Financial Close is reached, Notice to Proceed (NTP) will be given to the contractors to start construction. A summary of the next steps that the Project will take following this milestone is included in the below table.

Questions for Wind Farm Community Engagement Committee from the Woolsthorpe community and The Woolsthorpe Wind Farm Too High Too Close Action Group

#### For the meeting Friday 29th May 2025.

- 1. If the community benefit fund is not used up in a year, will these left over funds be put back into the kitty to be added to the next years \$72,000 funds?

  Response: Yes. Any unused funds will stay in the kitty and 'carry over' to the next year.
- 2. Will the WWF May 2025 newsletter be sent to all that are on "the email list" (as per the proponent) and printed out for the shop's brochure holder?

  Response: Copies of the newsletter were sent via email to the subscriber list. Copies of the newsletter were also placed at the General Store, 29 May.
- 3. Who is now part of the community engagement committee? Community members are unsure who they should talk to since we have not had any CEC meetings for quite some time. Why has there been such a hiatus of meetings?

CECs are advisory committees of Council. Formal CEC meetings could not be held during Council's caretaker period late last year, in accordance with the Local Government Act. All new CEC representative appointments then needed to be made by Council at an Ordinary Council Meeting, which occurred in March 2025.

4. We expect that the meeting with the contractor BMD will be held with all from the community and not just an employment drive.

Response: BMD were present at the CEC meeting 29/05 as an opportunity to meet the community representatives as well as visit the site and discuss key aspects for the balance of plant works.



The original intent, when this was discussed at the previous CEC meeting (April), was a proposal for BMD to host an informal drop-

in session which would provide local people/businesses with opportunities to identify their skills/business as a way for BMD to utilise local skills and businesses, where practicable.

It was further discussed during the May 29th CEC meeting, that this session could also be used as an opportunity to 'launch' the construction of the project where any member of the community can meet the contractor (BMD)/the Project team to ask questions about how and when construction will commence.

The date and details of this session will be advised in the future.

- 5. There was discussion of the proponent subsidising resident's power bills at a previous meeting. What was the response to this request?

  Response: This was discussed previously (see minutes of February 2024 CEC meeting). The proponent is not offering this but has maintained that if the community is resolved to allocating a portion of the community benefit fund to subsidising power bills of metered addresses, it could as it is a matter for the Woolsthorpe Community.
- 6. Could the community benefit fund be put towards residents accessing and acquiring solar batteries as an adjunct to solar panels?

Response: The purpose and intent of the community benefit fund is to '...generate positive action and investment that supports and contributes to social, economic and environmental sustainability of the community...'.

As per the project eligibility criteria, initiatives should deliver measurable tangible benefits to the residents and community. Ideally, grants should be for the benefit of the community interest, rather than self interest. However, in the future, if all/most residents had solar panels and wished support batteries this may be plausible.

- 7. When will the community benefit fund eligibility criteria be announced?
  Response: These are available on the proponent website; under Community and FAQS | Woolsthorpe WF. Refer here to the Community Benefit Fund Guidelines.
- 8. Have any truck movements begun via Wickham Rd prior to traffic management plans being announced?

Response: No works have commenced on site hence there are no truck movements associated with the wind farm at this point in time. (Note: The Traffic Management Plan has been endorsed by the Minister for Planning. It includes details on the approved traffic routes, plus road condition monitoring and maintenance requirements during construction). A copy is available on the project website:

- 9. If neighbours of the windfarm accept a neighbour compensation agreement or offsite landscaping programme, will that affect any of their legal rights in future if they have any complaint/dispute with the windfarm? Could these compensation agreements be used by a legal team to downplay any complaint/dispute? Response: As previously communicated, no. Neighbour payment agreements and the offsite landscaping program will not override or negate the ability of residents to raise compliance concerns in the future.
- 10. Are the blades used for these turbines safe? Are the neighbours and Woolsthorpe residents expected to wear hard hats in case of blade fragmentation? What has been learnt from previous blade issues?

Response: The turbines including blades are to be supplied by GE who provides assurance to the proponent regarding the quality of the blades and all turbine parts.

GE has further noted:

that GE takes safety very seriously and seeks continuous improvement including with respect to blade quality.

Last year, GE established a market leading inspection process whereby robotic crawlers are being used in conjunction with software to scan the inside of the turbine blades and create a digital certificate to certify the quality. This is also being undertaken at the port of import and at site prior to installation to ensure that blade quality is maintained throughout the logistics supply chain. This will be standard for the blades being produced and delivered for the Woolsthorpe Wind Farm.

Additionally, GE is improving its fleet monitoring through further development of our Blade CMS which is a monitoring system using sensors in the blades that serves as early-detection of blade damage within our operational fleet before a major event occurs. This will be standard for the Woolsthorpe Wind Farm.





11. How much is the Australian Government chipping in for this project to go ahead. Please give us a break down of who and how much is being spent on this windfarm by the tax payer?

Response: The project will not receive any direct funding from the Australian Government; however there is government legislation that supports the uptake of renewable energy, known as the Renewable Energy Target (RET). The RET was introduced in 2001 under the Howard Government and has been modified over time.

Under the RET:

for each Megawatt-hour (MWh) of generation from a renewable generator, 1 Large Generator Certificate (LGC) will be created.

Energy retailers are required to purchase a percentage of their electricity from renewable sources.

As such, to meet their obligations under the RET, energy retailers will purchase electricity and the associated created LGCs (from Projects such as Woolsthorpe Wind Farm via a Power Purchase Agreement) and surrender the LGCs to the Clean Energy Regulator. The incremental cost of the LGCs is therefore, in effect, passed on to consumers.

Notably, the RET has not been extended beyond 2030 so the price of LGCs is tending towards zero, particularly as more renewable generators are introduced. For Woolsthorpe Wind Farm, the assumed forecast of revenue (under its PPA) that is attributable to LGCs is expected to comprise only a small portion of project revenues after the first few years of operation.

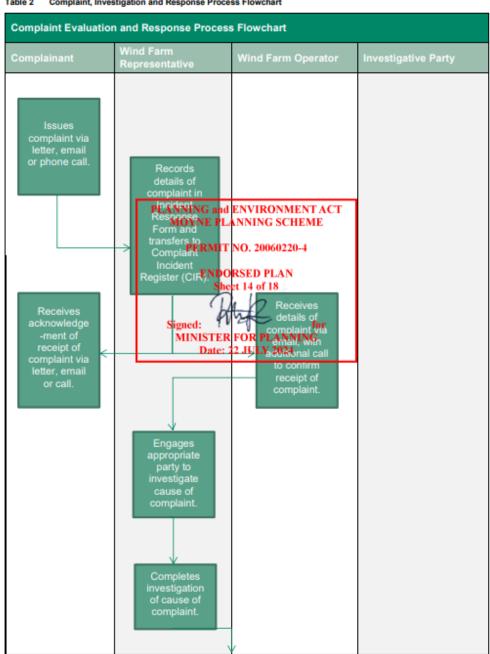

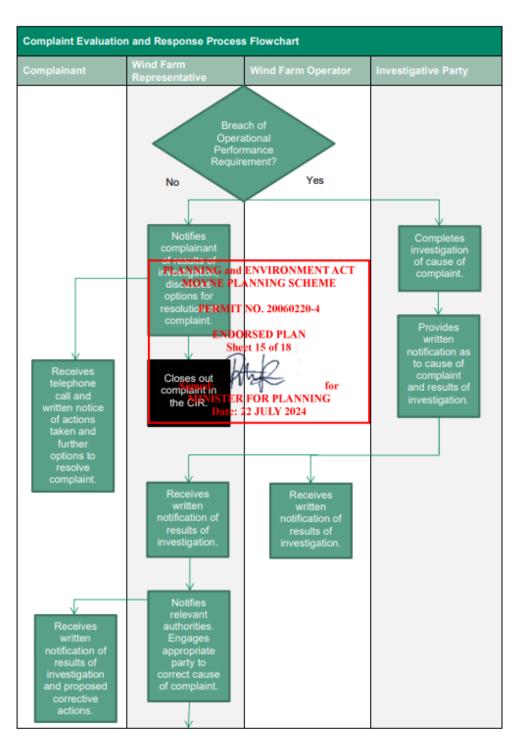
Table 2 Complaint, Investigation and Response Process Flowchart

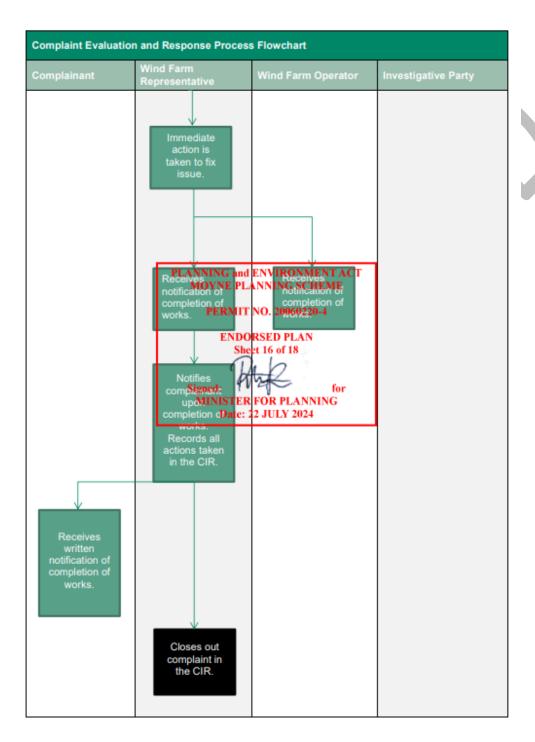

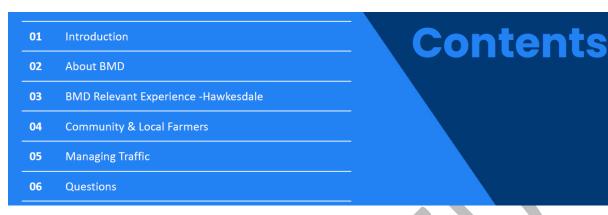

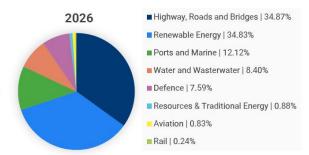
